New rehabilitation space opens

We have a fantastic new facility designed to support rehabilitation through physiotherapy and occupational therapy.

Our Enablement Team helps many patients who come to the Hospice for a short stav to manage symptoms such as pain, breathlessness and deconditioning to enable them to go home. Its new space includes a gym, kitchen and bathroom.

"Patients want to remain independent for as long as possible and it's well recognised that for patients receiving palliative care exercise is a key component." said Kerry Adams, Clinical Lead Physiotherapist. "The new gym will help patients live well with their changing condition."

The kitchen will enable patients to practise functional tasks from making a cup of tea, to meals and snacks, allowing a unique



space for their families to share in this experience.

Hannah Bold, Clinical Lead Occupational Therapist said: "These wonderful facilities are a safe space for patients to have a go at day-to-day activities, helping retain their independence for as long as possible. We're very lucky to have these facilities; they are going to have a huge impact on enabling and engaging our patients."



Supporting carers

Looking after someone with a terminal illness can be a huge emotional and physical challenge. Often carers struggle to find the support they need.

Our Supporting Carers programme is for the carers of Hospice patients. The sessions are a mix of practical help and emotional support and are designed to be flexible around caring commitments.

"Caring can be a lonely experience," said Veronica Mickleburgh, Patient

Experience Lead. "We hope these sessions will provide carers with useful information and interaction as well as empowering them to think about their own emotional needs."

"I found the group very supportive, they asked questions I didn't think of. We all seem to be in the same boat and it's nice to hear other people's concerns", said Michael, who attended the course.





Telephone Befriending is a new initiative from our Home Visiting Service. Volunteers contact patients and carers over the phone to offer a listening ear and friendly conversation.

We hope to reach family carers who can sometimes forget to stop and care for themselves. Telephone Befriending will run for 12 months initially and will then be evaluated to shape the service for the future.

Each lovingly crafted robin measures 14cm in height and can be fastened to a variety of indoor and outdoor surfaces.


The LOROS Robin will make the perfect addition to your home or garden and you can buy one for you or a friend for iust £25.



LOROS Hospice

Our Community Engagement Team develops and maintains links with local communities. various voluntary and statutory organisations and other hospices. Our aim is to further grow our services and raise awareness of what we do, and as a result increase knowledge of how and when to access the Hospice.

Our Cultural Support Officer engages with the many diverse faith communities and develops and maintains effective links to create opportunities between those communities and LOROS.

Our Youth Engagement Officer works with young people helping them learn more about the Hospice and other initiatives, such as Hospice School and work experience opportunities. We have just been awarded a grant from NHS England to establish youth ambassadors to raise awareness in schools and colleges.

LOROS Local is out and about in Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland and has a full calendar of visits planned. It continues to be accessed by a wide range of communities for a variety of reasons including delivery of care (see pages 20-21), support at fundraising events and awareness raising of our many services, including clinical, education, research and events.



We need to talk about death **Dying Matters Week 2019**

We held a hugely successful Dying Matters Week (13th-19th) in May.

Dving Matters week is a national awareness-raising campaign designed to encourage people to talk more openly about death, dying and bereavement.

There was a sell-out evening called We Need to Talk About Death, with Virgin Radio's Amy Voce and Dr Kathrvn Mannix. With cake and bubbly to kick off, the event was a frank and informal discussion about death and was a huge success.

We created a funeral song lip-sync video of Queen's Don't Stop Me

Now, where staff tour the Hospice, miming along to the song. Its proved very popular, receiving over 100,000 views at the time of going to print.

LOROS Local was out and about throughout the week in Jubilee Square in Leicester, Market Harborough, Oakham, Loughborough and Hinckley. LOROS volunteers and staff were on hand to help people think through what their funeral wishes might be with a simple 'My funeral wishes' questionnaire designed to begin the conversation.

The pinnacle of the week was LOROS Patron and comedian

Grea Davies in conversation with 'Griefcast' podcaster Cariad Lloyd and comedian Barry Castagnola. The packed show was the perfect end to a week of taboo-busting awareness raising.

Nicole and Dean's story

■ Nicole's husband, Dean Hanson, was just 46 when he found himself needing care from LOROS.

He was diagnosed with advanced pancreatic cancer in November 2018 and just five weeks later, on 27th December, he died at LOROS.

Ever since then, Nicole, along with her family and friends, have been fundraising for the Hospice because as she says, LOROS "made everything so much more manageable".

"LOROS gave us so much, in such a short amount of

time." said Nicole, who has two children with Dean. Harry, 14, and Luke, 28.

"I don't think any amount of money we raise would ever pay back the care and memories that LOROS gave to us, I can't thank them enough."

Just two days after being diagnosed, Dean was given the devastating news that the cancer had spread to his lungs and liver.



"The hardest part was telling friends and family. How do you tell your 14-year-old son what dad has been diagnosed

By mid-December, Dean's health took a dramatic turn for the worse and he was admitted to LOROS.

with?"

"The consultant was so open and honest. He told us from the moment we arrived just how poorly Dean was. Although we



didn't want to hear those words. I cannot thank him enough now."

The day before Christmas Eve, as they tried to make the most of the time Dean had left, they went on a trip to Bradgate Park with the children and grandchildren.

"It was a grizzly day but Dean wanted to go, so one of the nurses found him a woolly hat. Even just their kindness in finding Dean a hat meant so much.



"LOROS gave us those memories."

"Dean's main goal was to be home for Christmas and we did that, thanks to LOROS. The nurses helped him get ready, the Hospice's teams sorted out his pain management and we went home.

"Our two grandchildren came over with the family and for those few hours, we were given a little bit of normality again. LOROS gave us those memories."

Nicole and her family have since been fundraising by signing up to the LOROS Lottery and taking part in events including the Twilight Walk and Mudnificent Seven.

Her employer, British Gas, has chosen LOROS as its charity of the year and employees are taking part in a fundraising skvdive.

All in a day's work

I am Angela Baxter, the Complementary Therapy Manager at LOROS, and I manage a team of six therapists and 15 volunteers. We offer a range of therapies to patients and their loved ones at LOROS.

8.30am: I arrive at the Hospice, check my emails and set up the complementary therapy rooms for the day with towels and essential oils.

9am: I check with my team to see if we have any spare appointments for the following day.

9.50am: Our Complementary Therapy volunteer will arrive to see patients in Day Therapy.

10am: I usually have a number of Outpatient appointments, providing complementary therapy to patients, carers, family members and bereaved relatives.





11.15am: This week I'm running a wellbeing session for Day Therapy patients, focusing on mindfulness. Patients have a huge influence on the services we offer. Increasingly they are interested in improving their wellbeing.

12pm: Another Outpatient appointment. We see patients over a six-month period, encouraging them to apply relaxation techniques to other stressful situations they encounter. For example, a patient said he used the techniques when he underwent chemotherapy, and it really helped. When I hear stories like that I feel privileged to be working here, and it motivates me to do more.

1pm: I try to find time to have lunch with my team, it's good to catch up.

1.30pm: I visit patients and their carers on the Inpatient Ward, Our services complement the clinical care LOROS provides.

3-4pm: Team meeting. It's really important to get the whole team together once a month including the volunteers, who are a vital part of our service.

3-5pm: Mindfulness course. I run an eight-week programme of mindfulness training with volunteers and staff. We invest in our volunteers by giving them opportunities to improve their skills, experience and knowledge, and this shows how highly we value them.



Did you know?

- We offer a range of complementary therapies including aromatherapy, reflexology, and Indian head massage.
- We also offer our services across the county through LOROS Local so our patients don't have to travel so far for their appointments.
- Nearly 35% of the work we do is delivered by our dedicated volunteers.
- We encourage patients to think how they can help themselves, taking a holistic approach looking at sleeping, stress and nutrition. Our main aim is to empower patients and their carers to be mindful and see where they can make a positive difference to their wellbeing.

How coming to LOROS can be therapy in itself

■ Life for Kamini Raja changed completely when she

It was in 2013 when the now 55-year-old found the lump. At first, she did not think it would be anything serious but after seeing a doctor and having a biopsy, she was given the news that the cancer had spread.

Kamini has gone from having a jam-packed social calendar, to spending most of her time at home, feeling exhausted.

"Before I had cancer. I never had to depend on anyone

but I've had to give up work and I hardly go out now, as my immune system is so rubbish," she said.

"I feel like I take two steps forward and five back.

"Coming to LOROS gives me a push forward."

Kamini says that coming into LOROS allows her to discuss her problems with others facing the same challenges and going through a similar journey.





"I often go into LOROS exhausted, but after spending time at the Hospice I feel I can face life again," she added.

"It's a safe place to talk and I can say as much or as little as I want."

Most of the time she finds herself laughing and smiling while at LOROS.

"One time I came in and they asked me what I felt like doing. and I said all I wanted to do was play with paint like children.



"The next thing I knew, we were doing just that, playing with paint.

"Coming to LOROS really is therapy in itself; it's the tender love and care that I need."

Kamini also has complementary therapy which she has found very helpful.

"I cannot thank the staff and volunteers enough for how they look after all of the patients," she added.



Our Drop-in sessions now run on a weekly basis, every Tuesday. They are for patients with non-terminal and terminal illnesses, including cancer, Motor Neurone Disease, heart failure and respiratory failure.

Carers are also welcome, either with a patient or alone.

You don't have to be known to LOROS to attend or have been referred by a doctor, but you must be 18 or over, self-caring and independent, as well as able to get to and from the Hospice.

That means that if you donate £20 worth of items, they will actually increase to £25 for LOROS because you have added Retail Gift Aid.

So, if you are a UK tax payer, make sure you always tick the Retail Gift Aid box when donating items to any of our LOROS shops.













Crucial role of LOROS research nurses

LOROS has two very busy research nurses whose role is to support patients and families who contribute to our research projects.

Natalie Rich previously worked in intensive care and genetics research at the University Hospitals of Leicester, Naomi Seaton was a nurse on the LOROS Ward and in Day Therapy, but over

the past three years has focused on helping patients and families participate in research studies

Last year, more than 100 LOROS patients with cancer participated in a national study to see how doctors and nurses could improve information they provide to patients about how quickly their



illness will change. This year, work has focused on Motor Neurone Disease. Projects look at quality of life, a new national register for the illness and how management of symptoms can be improved.

Funding for our research nurses comes through a contract with the East Midlands National Institute for Health Research Clinical Research Network. LOROS has a strong relationship with the national NHS research system so patients and families can contribute to research and make a difference to care in the future. We are humbled by the generosity and altruism of people at such a challenging time in their lives.

Admiral Nurse joins LOROS

LOROS has appointed an Admiral Nurse with a specialist knowledge of dementia.



Cathy Knight will raise awareness of dementia and deliver training to staff and volunteers, helping to improve support for carers and families.

"People often have very negative perceptions of dementia – thev immediately think of aggression and 'challenging behaviour', but lots of people live with dementia very well for a long time", said Cathy.

Cathy's role is part-funded by Dementia UK, the charity that supports Admiral Nurses.



"Dementia is on the rise. with one million people in the UK likely to be diagnosed by 2021. As a result, it's important we understand how to help patients and families manage the condition better, from diagnosis through to end of life," said Cathy.

"I will be helping our nurses understand how best to care for people living with dementia, who may also be living with other long term, palliative conditions."

Cathy will train LOROS staff and volunteers to recognise early stages of the condition and offer support.

Ruth Auton, Director of Education and Workforce said: "I OROS aims to be a dementia-friendly organisation."


