Stair lifts information and advice

This factsheet is for guidance only and has been produced with assistance from healthcare professionals

How do stair lifts work?

Stair lifts carry you up and down stairs by you sitting on a small seat with arm rests and a lap belt. If you are finding climbing the stairs increasingly difficult or very tiring, you may wish to consider a stair lift as an alternative. Stair lifts run on a battery and are operated by controls on the armrests or a remote-controlled unit operated by the client or carer. They have battery backup so will continue to work in the event of a power cut. Stair lifts are fixed to the stairs rather than the wall, battery charges top and bottom at it's docking station.

Types of stair lift

There are two main types of stair lift:

- · Straight stair lift
- Curved stair lift

Curved stair lifts are suitable for stairs with a bend or curve at the top or bottom. Having a curved staircase does not necessarily mean you need a curved stair lift. Stair lift companies are able to assess your stairs and advise you on the best option and any potential additions. When considering a stair lift, it is wise to get more than one quote as prices can vary enormously.

Funding your stair lift

1. Social Services

Social Services can assess your needs and may recommend a stair lift funded by a Disabled Facilities Grant (DFG). This is a means tested grant and it can only be accessed through a Social Services occupational therapist. You can refer yourself to Social Services by telephoning your local Social Services department.

2. Self-funded

Stair lifts can be bought or hired privately and this may be the preferred option if a stair lift is needed quickly. Many companies offer a rental service (mostly for straight stair lifts) and this is considerably cheaper than buying.

Usually companies charge a one-off rental fee (which may include maintenance and removal charges) and an amount per month for rental. It is worth checking with the company if there is a minimum or maximum rental period. Stair lifts may also be sold as 'reconditioned' or 'reallocated' (second hand). If a stair lift is purchased for your own use, you should not be charged VAT.

Safety: It is essential the stair lift user has the **cognitive ability** to safely use a stair lift as per manufacturers instructions and understand how to use the stair lift, lap belt and controls to keep them safe. Memory impairment can put an individual at risk

If you purchase or rent a stair lift privately then it is your responsibility to ensure your safety getting on and off. All stair lifts are fitted with armrests and a seat belt. It is recommended that both armrests are down and the seat belt fastened when using the stair lift. The user needs to be able to pay attention throughout the stair lift use and be able to manage issues such as it bleeping / not charging and be able to manage change in speed and direction. **Speak to your GP / Health professional / Occupational Therapist if you are concerned about memory issues.**
